Re DOJ investigation of MS.
No big issues that are harming our products. Lot's of little things that seem like "bullying" tactics. When we push back hard enough and long enough, they always come around. If the DOJ wants to come in and ask them questions, they would be happy to talk to them.

The issues that come to mind are:

1. Win 95 "mail" or "e-mail" help section talks all about Exchange. They've asked MS to take that out, but it hasn't happened yet.
2. GroupWise has to use MAPI in order to run on Win95 and NT. MAPI was originally slated by MS to be an open platform to which anyone could write. However, they tied it to Exchange and until recently, we couldn't get MAPI except in Exchange. So customers would have to buy both GW and Exchange to use GW. Rich and Lynn believe MS has reversed their course on this because of the noise from other e-mail vendors. The expect MAPI and Exchange to be treated as separate products.
3. Win95 beta had APIs for Explorer so that GW could run with Explorer. Then they announced that they were taking out those APIs. Four weeks ago, they release documentation for those same APIs in the form of a mail reader. It appears they were never taken out. Explorer and other MS apps have been using them.
4. "Common Controls", a group of DLLs and APIs, shipped with Win95. MS has recently upgraded them. It appears that the updates were jointly developed by the MS web browser group and the OS group. At the moment of their release, the web browser and other MS apps are using them. Everyone else has to wait for them to release, then write to them.

Rich and Lynn both acknowledged that one of the difficulties is just keeping up with the volume of material MS produces. It's hard to prove that MS is maliciously keeping things away from people.

They suggest we talk to Rob Steel and Kent Sievers to see if they know any more.
